RE: Extension Request for Request for Information Regarding the Draft Interagency Guidance Framework for Considering the exercise of March-In Rights (Docket No.: 230831-0207)

Dear Associate Director Bahar,

On behalf of the Association of American Universities, the Association of Public and Land-grant Universities, the Association of American Medical Colleges, the American Council on Education, AUTM, and COGR, we are writing to request a 90-day extension to the public comment period on the above-referenced Request for Information by NIST in order to provide the research university community with sufficient time to analyze and respond to the proposed changes to the draft interagency guidance framework. Our member universities represent a significant portion of the academic research enterprise and recipients of federal research funding subject to the reporting requirements of the Bayh-Dole Act.

The draft interagency guidance framework represents a significant departure from the current criterion under which federal agencies analyze and assess whether to exercise march-in rights to a subject invention. The current criterion has existed for more than 40 years in federal statute and these proposed changes will have significant impact on the ability of federal funding recipients to license research discoveries through the technology transfer process.

We will need additional time to gather data and fully assess the potential impact of the proposed changes to the university technology transfer sector to provide NIST with a more complete assessment to better inform your regulatory obligations. Accordingly, we respectfully request a 90-day extension to the comment period for filing comments on the RFI.
