Uniform Guidance Revisions - Then, Now and When

Just one year ago, COGR was finalizing its assessment of OMB's 2 CFR 200 (Uniform Guidance/UG) revisions that went into effect October 1, 2024. The results of COGR's work were documented in a "Look" series, describing the changes and culminating in an Implementation and Readiness Guide. No one could have guessed that only a year later we would be anticipating additional, likely much more consequential, revisions.





We now have the final draft of OMB's 2025 Compliance Supplement, which includes audit guidance reflecting the 2024 UG revisions. During this session we will revisit the 2024 revisions in light of the audit guidance found in the 2025 Compliance Supplement and highlight other noteworthy changes.

When will OMB release its latest revisions, what will the revisions include, and how will they impact the <u>JAG's FAIR</u> model initiative? While little is known, COGR staff and member institutions are preparing and a panel will share COGR and institutional progress and plans with the audience.
