Members of the Research Compliance and Administration (RCA) Committee will provide updates to topic areas covered within the committee, including but not limited to an update on current conundrums with Public Access initiatives, survey results regarding PMS and Treasury's ASAP systems, and an update on subaward initiatives.

<u>Contracts & Intellectual Property Current Issues & Priorities.</u> Members of the COGR Contracts and Intellectual Property Committee (CIP) will discuss current issues and priorities, including dealing with controlled unclassified information; challenges in technology transfer including march-in requests, drug pricing issues, and calls for greater returns on federal R&D investments; the Department of Education open licensing requirement; and challenges in relationships with foundations (also the subject of a panel session later in the day).

Research Quality and Reproducibility

Research and Regulatory Reform committee member Naomi Schrag, Vice President for Research Compliance, Training, and Policy, Columbia University, will moderate this session on research quality and reproducibility. Panelists will include Bob Finkelstein, Director, Division of Extramural Research, National Institute of Neurological Disorders and Stroke; Ross McKinney, Chief Scientific Officer, Association of American Medical Colleges; and Rebecca Osthus, Science Policy Analyst, American Physiological Society.

Nina Easton is Chair, Fortune Most Powerful Women International, Co-Chair, Fortune Global Forum; Principal, Sellers Easton Media and Fox News Analyst. From 2005-2016 Nina was a senior editor and award–winning columnist at Fortune magazine. For nearly two decades, she was a regular TV commentator, providing inside analysis on U.S. elections, Washington politics, foreign affairs, and the economy for top national news shows. She was a prime-time panelist on Fox News Special Report and Fox News Sunday, and also provided commentary on such programs as NBC's Meet the Press, CBS's Face the Nation.

A panel comprising representatives from Foundations, University and Nonprofit Research Institutions will share perspectives on the partnership and new opportunities to address issues of mutual interest.
